### **Draft Insiders' Digest - 33rd Season**

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#### **NFL Draft 2024 Review by Teams**

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*The 2024 NFL Draft was the 89th annual meeting of National Football League teams to select newly eligible players for the upcoming NFL season. The first round was held on April 25, followed by the second and third rounds on April 26<sup>th</sup>. The draft concluded with rounds 4–7 on April 27<sup>th</sup>. The NFL held the event live in Hart Plaza in Detroit, Michigan for the first time. It set a record of over 775,000 fans in attendance. All team selections took place from Detroit with league commissioner Roger Goodell announcing the early selections from the podium.*

*The Chicago Bears owned the first overall this year after trading for it with the Carolina Panthers, prior to last year's draft, for multiple draft picks and wide receiver D. J. Moore. The Bears selected QB Caleb Williams with the first overall pick this April. He was the first of a record setting six QBs chosen in the first round. It tied the famous 1983 NFL Draft of 6 QBs with 3 HOF passers in Elway, Kelly and Marino. A record number of receivers 7 were also chosen in the first round tying the 2004 draft class. In addition, the first round set a record of 23 offensive players selected in the opening round with the first 14 draft choices from the offensive side of the ball.*

*The Panthers selected Alabama quarterback Bryce Young with the first overall pick in 2023.*

#### **2020 Resolution JC-2A picks**

**Since the 2021 NFL Draft, the league, under 2020 Resolution JC-2A passed in November 2020, rewards teams for developing minority candidates for head coach and/or general manager positions. The resolution rewards teams whose minority candidates are hired away for one of those positions by awarding draft picks. These draft picks are at the end of the third round, after standard compensatory picks; if multiple teams qualify, they are awarded by draft order in the first round. These picks are in addition to, and have no impact on, the standard 32 compensatory picks. Two picks were awarded for the 2024 draft pursuant to the resolution.**

**Cleveland received a third-round selection along with a 2022 third-round selection when Minnesota hired the Browns' vice president of football operations Kwesi Adofo-Mensah as general manager.**

**San Francisco received a third-round selection when Washington hired San Francisco's vice president of player personnel Martin Mayhew as general manager.**

**Kansas City received a third-round selection and a 2022 third-round selection when Chicago hired the Chiefs' executive director of player personnel Ryan Poles as general manager.**

**San Francisco received a third-round selection and a second 2022 third-round selection after Miami also hired the 49ers' former offensive coordinator Mike McDaniels as head coach.**

**San Francisco received a third-round selection and a 2024 third-round selection after Tennessee hired former 49ers director of player personnel Ran Carthon as general manager.**

The Cardinals held on to the 4th overall selection and choose wideout Marvin Harrison. They turned down a few offers to move back, but refused to make a deal with a generational player like Harrison on the board. He gives young QB Kyler Murray a much needed #1 receiver. He has the package to be special early in his career and it was a wise move to claim a true blue-chip prospect and great fit here. They held a 2<sup>nd</sup> #1 pick from a 2023 trade with the Texans. They choose DL Darius Robinson, a versatile fast rising prospect off a strong postseason. He fits their front and best

suited for the five-technique role. He has the development to start as a rookie and give their front a much-needed boost after finishing last in the league in run defense. He was an excellent addition here.

In the 2nd round, they chose the first of three cornerbacks with the selection of Max Melton. He had a strong postseason and has the talent, development and intangibles to win a starting job in camp. He has graded out high in a few techniques and has a big upside. He was the 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive corner chosen in the early 2nd round. With four 3rd round picks after trades, they choose runner Trey Benson, OL Isaiah Adams, TE Tip Reiman and corner Elijah Jones. Benson is a young physical back who will push starter James Connor. He shows power between the tackles and reliable hands. He must prove capable of picking up blitz situations and durable over the season. OL Adams was a surprise this early, though is experienced at both guard and tackle and will push for early starting time if any regular falters. TE Tip Reiman tested out very well in the postseason and rose up the charts quickly. He is a tough inline blocker and shows reliable hands and good route running thin the shorter zones. His presence allows the Cards to move talented vet Trey McBride around to create mismatches in multiple sets. CB Elijah Jones finished strong and was another prospect who moved up the ranking fast. He displays fine man coverage skills to push for immediate time in the nickel and dime packages.

In the 4th round, they chose DB Dadrion Taylor-Demerson, a versatile defender with a multiple of skills to fit into a few roles in their secondary. He moves well with good speed, instincts and range to press for time in the dime package. With two 5th round picks, they chose edge Xavier Thomas and OT Christian Jones. Thomas has the burst off the edge to be a factor in the sub package. He must prove to be durable to live up to his nice potential. OT Jones came on strong in the postseason, though most feel he is limited to the right side. He is physical and has the prototypical size for the outside with the toughness and agility to surprise. He was excellent value here. In the 6th round, they chose wideout Tejhaun Palmer, a good-sized athlete who will compete for a roster spot on their thin receiving corps. He needs to impress in camp. In the 7th round, they chose CB Jaden Davis, a quick cover man with extensive experience at two big time programs. He can surprise here and win a roster or PS spot with interesting upside. GM Monti Ossenfort had another strong draft class to build this changing roster. **Grade: A+**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Cards' signed RT Jonah Williams to bookend Paris Johnson. They added second tier FAs, guard Evan Brown, WR Chris Moore, CB Sean Murphy-Bunting and QB Desmond Ridder. They released LT DJ Humphries. They lost receivers, Marquise Brown and Rondale Moore leaving a big void. Rookie UDFAs, DL Myles Murphy, WR Xavier Weaver and LB Joe Shimko can surprise and win a roster spot here with a good camp. DL Murphy could develop into a solid rotational piece for this front.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Cards finished with another 4-13 season with QB Kyler Murray returning from his ACL injury at midseason. He holds the key to any return to postseason contention and has much to prove after regressing significantly since the Cards playoff loss in 2021. At times, he has been a disgruntled player who can create undo problems, in addition to real durability concerns. Both lines will undergo changes with FA losses. They look to runner James Connor share the feature back role with rookie Benson. Rookie WR Harrison has impact talent and could be the catalyst to any turnaround. Their defense was among the worst in the league and lost most of their prime players in recent years. LB Zaven Collins needs to step up along with 2nd year BJ Ojulari and provide edge pressure. Their secondary allowed too many big plays and will look to young corners to become fixtures here. Pro Bowl safety Budda Baker is the stabilizing force here, though could be traded for the right offer. The very tough NFC West will demand that Murray return to prior levels. This club though remains in transition on both offense and defense. They need the young talent to settle in important positions. Strong draft classes must become core performers here to avoid ranking among the worst clubs in the league.

The Falcons held their 4th consecutive top 8 selection. They shocked personnel men and draftniks with the selection of QB Michael Penix, their 4th consecutive offensive player in the 1st round. Penix was a wild card QB in this class off injury concerns and some delivery and pocket awareness. With the huge signing of vet Kirk Cousins, it is excessive to use a top 8 pick on a prospect who most likely sits his first two seasons. Probably the biggest gamble in Atlanta in years

and one which seems unnecessary this early.

They traded up in the 2nd round to select to add DL Ruke Orhorhoro, a versatile defender with developed pass rushing skills. He is the first of four draft choices for the front seven after poor big play production. Orhorhoro figures to push for a starting job if he has a strong camp. He has improved annually, though a reach this early.

With their 3rd and 4th round picks, they chose edge rushers Bralen Trice and Brandon Dorlus. Trice is a physical non-stop defender who performed well on one of the best college units. He gets a big chance here, though must disprove a subpar postseason. Dorlus is a hot and cold defender who needs to improve his instincts and technique to become a force off the edge. He faces a big challenge in camp and a key addition to this class.

On the 5th round, they chose LB JD Bertrand, a savvy defender with strong tackling skills. His marginal speed must be overcome, though he has the makeup to be an immediate core special teams performer. With three 6th round picks, they chose runner Jase McClellan, WR Casey Washington and DT Zion Logue. McClellan is a physical back who runs hard between the tackles. He can block vs backers and protect the QB, though needs work on the receiving game. WR Washington is a good athlete with average speed. He competes well for the ball and can win a roster spot here with a good camp. DT Logue is a massive interior defender who is raw and needs time. He is a long athlete with power and athleticism to create havoc inside if he improves technique. **Grade: C**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Falcons were aggressive in the FA market. They signed veteran QB Kirk Cousins for a huge \$180 million contract coming off Achilles surgery following his midseason injury. He looks to bring a talented young offense together. They added receivers, Darnell Mooney and Rondale Moore to give them a

strong skill position group. They added marginal defensive veterans. They lost edge vets, Calais Campbell and Bud Dupree. They added an average UDFA class this year with TE Aaron Stogner and punter Ryan Sanborn. Both can win a roster spot here.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Falcons continue rebuilding program and addressed their QB problems with the signing of Cousins and drafting Penix. They traded Desmond Ridder for a late pick. They have had six consecutive sub .500 records and they hope to improve after another 7-10 record. They improved running the ball behind rookie Bijorn Robinson. Their QB play was weak which is why they ranked among the league's work in scoring. They look to young wideout Drake London and TE Kyle Pitts to step up with the expected improvement in the passing game. Their defense struggled again throughout last season and looks to rookies to elevate this unit. Their front seven added a few key potential starters. Pro Bowler DT Grady Jarrett missed half the season due to a knee injury. The Falcons' defense ranked near poorly in all vital statistics. They need their young secondary to improve quickly after another poor performance. FA addition safety Jessie Bates provided leadership and playmaking ability here. Veteran corner AJ Terrell is a shutdown cover man. This club needs to improve quickly especially on defense to compete in the average South. The NFC South continues to change and the Falcons will have to take a step up to be competitive. Capable to compete in a soft division.

The Panthers made a major deal last year to move up to the first overall selection to draft Bryce Young. They paid a huge price to move from the 9th spot to the first overall pick which included this year's #1 overall selection. They moved into the late 1st round moving up one spot to secure the player plus the 5th year option for first round selections. They chose wideout Xavier Leggette, a big

athlete with length and playmaking talent. He needs some route development to win a starting job. In their young receiving corps, he could emerge as their #1 receiver in a short time. He gives QB Bryce Young a huge target in the intermediate routes and red zone situations. Young needs to take a step up this season after a disappointing rookie season where they finished last in passing and among the worst in the league in key statistics.

On the 2nd round, they chose runner Jonathon Brooks with the pick acquired from the Giants for edge defender Brian Burns. Brooks is an elusive back with the burst to break plays. He is coming off 2023 ACL surgery, though may be ready for the start of the start. Probable starter when healthy and good addition here. On the 3rd round, they chose LB Trevin Wallace, a tackling machine who came on fast over his final season. Physical defender with burst to finish and range to make stops on the perimeter when he reads plays properly. Strong Senior Bowl moved him up further and has the skill set and production to win a starting Mike role as a rookie.

On the 4th round, they chose TE Ja'Tavion Sanders, an athletic receiver with length, speed and playmaking ability. He was excellent value here and gives Young an excellent weapon in the intermediate routes and especially the seam. Playmaker with big upside and top addition here. He has performed at a high-level vs top competition and has excelled on the big stage. On the 5th round, they chose corner Chau Smith-Wade, a tough quick cover man who was very impressive at the Senior Bowl. He shows keen instincts and technique to put himself in position to make plays. Shorter than ideal and best suited for the inside and possible early starting nickel corner.

On the 6th round, they chose DT Jaden Crumedy, a big physical defender who improved over his long career. He gets a huge opportunity here with little depth inside. Performed well on a big stage and handles the physicality well, though a limited rusher. Capable of surprising with some development. On the 7th round, they chose LB Michael Barrett, a tough instinctive backer with the skills to excel on special teams. Limited athlete with excellent intangibles who performed well on a big stage – powerful tackler with toughness and instincts to be a fixture on special teams and top locker room player.

**Grade: B**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Panthers traded for vet receiver Diontae Johnson for CB Donte Jackson. Johnson gives QB Young a highly productive playmaker who gets open consistently. They invested heavily on vet guards Robert Hunt and Damien Lewis to improve their weak interior. They added vets, DT A'Shawn Robinson, edge defenders Jadeveon Clowney and DJ Wonnum and safety Jordan Fuller. They lost vets, LB Frankie Lulu and Deion Jones, wideouts D.J. Chark and Laviska Shenault, safeties Vonn Bell and Jeremy Chinn, edge defenders Yetur Gross-Matos and Marquis Haynes, TE Hayden Hurst, CB Shaquill Griffin, C Bradley Bozeman and guard Gabe Jackson. They added a good rookie UDFA class in QB Jack Plummer, RB Jaden Shirden, WR Jalen Coker, WR Sam Pinkney, OT Jeremiah Crawford, C Andrew Raym, DE Darius Hodges, DE Popo Aumavae, OLB Kenny

Dyson, LB Jackson Mitchell, CB Willie Drew and S Demani Richardson. Plummer, Shirden and Coker should get a long look and gain a PS spot. OL Raym and safety Richardson can surprise and make this roster.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Panthers finished at the bottom of the league with a 2-15 record. During owner David Tupper's five years at the helm they have fired 3 head coaches, all at midseason. They have started 9 different QBs over the past six seasons with poor drafts and trades purging this roster. QB Young hopes to benefit from an improved supporting cast with half the offense first year starters. They look to rookies WR Leggette, runner Brooks and TE Sanders to play key roles in this attack. Vet guards Hunt and Lewis are counted on to anchor the middle. The line may hold the key to any overall improvement. The defense will look to recent draft classes to take a huge step this season. The front four will have to improve after average results at best in most key areas. DT Brown is capable of being a dominant interior lineman, though needs help from edge defenders. Rookie Mike LB Trevin Wallace is counted on to anchor the middle of this unit. The secondary went through more changes with vet Joe Horn facing a critical season after missing extensive time once again. Safety Xavier Woods is a solid defender with well-rounded talent to lead this unit. This club is in transition with vital roster building underway. Key areas especially QB need to improve and direct this club. The defense will have a new face at important areas and look to improvement after allowing too many big plays and overall points. They face an uphill battle to approach the .500 level and escape the NFC South basement. They are just starting to build a stronger roster.

The Bears addressed a major problem with the 1st overall selection when they chose QB Caleb Williams. They obtained that selection with a trade with Carolina last spring to move up to select QB Bryce Young. Williams is a highly developed passer who can make all the throws whether in the pocket or on the move. He has a strong receiving corps in DJ Moore, Keenan Allen and rookie top pick Rome

Odunze plus TE Cole Kmet. Williams developed quickly working with HC Lincoln Riley which should enhance his ability to start as a rookie. He looks to become the face of the franchise and the Bears best QB in decades.

With their second 1st round pick, they added wideout Rome Odunze, a big physical receiver with developed playmaking talent. He fits in here well on a receiving corps where he does not have to be the #1 weapon. He could thrive in a spread offense which allows Williams to find the single coverage. front and changing secondary.

In the 3rd round, they selected OT Kiran Amegadjie, a big athletic lineman coming off a quad injury which cost him the postseason. He has the skill set to man the left tackle role in time, though needs development and probably lines up at RT or guard by year two. Excellent long-term investment. In the 4th round, they selected punter Tory Taylor, a strong legged kicker with an impressive long resume. Punted very well in a bad climate and an excellent fit here and a defensive weapon. In the 5th round, they selected edge rusher Austin Booker, a long quick athlete with impact ability. Comes off the edge with a burst to make big plays. Currently, a one-dimensional defender, though he brings impact off the edge which fits here very well. Very good value at this point of the process

**Grade: A**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Bears were limited in the vet FA market by cap restrictions. They signed key veterans, RB D'Andre Swift, TE Gerald Everett and safety Kevin Byard. They traded 3rd day picks for wideout Keenan Allen and OL Ryan Bates. They traded former 1st round pick, QB Justin Fields for a 6th round pick. They lost FAs, wideout Mooney, RB Foreman, TE Lewis and Tonyan, OL Cody Whitehair and Lucas Patrick, defenders, edge Ngakoue, DT Jones and safety Jackson. Added an average group of UDFAs in QB Austin Reed, WR Peter LeBlanc, WR Ian Wheeler, TE Brendan Bates, OT Theo Benedet, DL Jamree Kromah, DL Keith Randolph Jr., LB Carl Jones Jr. and DB Reddy Stewart. OT Benedet has interesting skills and warrants a look here, though probably on the PS. DL Kromah and Randolph can surprise and win a roster spot and eventually play in their rotation.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Bears finished in last place in the NFC North which led to major changes especially on offense. They initiated a big roster turnover with their two #1 picks both offensive impact players. They look young QB Williams to step in and provide vital playmaking and leadership. Wideout Rome Odunze can give this attack a quick boost. Vet Keenan Allen gives them a savvy playmaker who will adjust quickly in this offense. Their passing game finished last year near the bottom in the league. Their ground game ranked high with a committee headed by Khalil Herbert. The offensive line relies on RT Darnell Wright and guard Teven Jenkins to provide improved protection for Williams, after allowing 50 sacks in 2023. Guard Nate Davis must step up after an injury riddled first season in Chitown. LT Braxton Jones has improved with experience. Their receiving corps looks to DJ Moore to continue to open the passing game. Their defense improved in 2023 behind edge Sweat and rookie tackle Dexter. The young

secondary allowed big plays and too much yardage, though has the talent to be a top unit. Young starters CBs Gordon, Johnson and rookie Stevenson made fast strides in 2023. Safety Brisker became a leader and will benefit from the addition of veteran Byard. They look to their young nucleus to step up here. They will rely on young QB Williams to give this attack impact and sound decision making. The defense must show further maturity for this club to compete for a playoff spot. Bears can improve in the average NFC North, though may be another season away from being more than a marginal .500 club.

The Cowboys had major issues on their offensive line and addressed that unit three times in their draft class. They moved back in the 1st round five spots and still landed OT Tyler Guyton. The prospect earmarked. Guyton is a massive nimble athlete with left tackle skills though experience on only the right side. He addresses a major need area and is expected to compete for immediate starting time. They acquired a 3rd round pick for moving back and landed OL Cooper Beebe with the

73rd overall selection. He is an excellent addition with versatility for most positions. His high level of development makes him NFL ready on the interior and probable rookie starter with pressing their issues inside. Their first-round selection (#24) probably produces two rookie starting linemen after trade.

With their 2nd round pick, they addressed their defensive front and choose edge Marshawn Kneeland. He was a fast-rising prospect off a strong final season and postseason. He shows quickness and power off the edge along with the base to anchor and hold the edge. Solid addition here though must prove up to the physicality on the strongside where he will face the double team regularly. Defender on the come and plays immediately in their line rotation and early starter. With two 3rd round picks, they chose OL Beebe and LB Marist Liufau. Beebe probably starts. Liufau is another early middle round backer chosen over the past four draft classes. He is an active defender who makes plays, though can get tied up by bigger blockers often. He should excel on special teams, and shows high development in coverage to play in the sub packages He was a reach this early.

On the 5th round, they chose corner Caelen Carson, a quality athlete with extensive experience in the secondary. Good size and skill set, with some injuries over his career which pushed him down the charts. He can earn time in the dime package where his good tackling and instincts might warrant early reps. Solid addition. On the 6th round, they chose wideout Ryan Flounoy, a fast-developing small college prospect. He performed well at the Senior Bowl and drew attention. He combines a high level of development with sure hands, nice length and radius with the toughness to compete for the pass.

With two 7th round picks, they chose OL Nathan Thomas and DT Justin Rogers. Thomas is a tackle/guard swing lineman with bulk and agility. He is an intriguing prospect for an organization which has been very savvy adding offensive linemen. He can make this roster. Rogers is a wide body defender with raw technique currently. He has excellent natural strength and the base to hold the point vs double team blocks. He struggles to finish especially as a pass rusher. He comes off the snap only adequately and gets tied up consistently when his first move is contained. He can earn a roster/ PS spot with a good training camp performance. He needs much development and is a candidate for the PS. **Grade: C**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Cowboys signed veteran FAs, LB Eric Kendricks, runners Eeke Elliott and Royce Freeman, DT Carl Davis and Damien Wilson. Most were stopgap additions. They lost starters, RB Tony Pollard, WR Michael Gallup, LT Tyron Smith, center Tyler Biadasz, DE Dorance Armstrong, DT Johnathan Hankins, CB Stephon Gilmore and safety Jayon Kearse. They leave a few huge holes on both units. LB Leighton Vander Esch retired due to medical issues. They signed an average rookie UDFA class with only a few prospects with a chance to make this roster. They added RB Nathaniel Peat, WR Corey Crooms, WR Cam Johnson, TE Brevyn Spann-Ford, TE Alec Holler, DT Denzel Daxon, LB Jason Johnson, Brock Mogensen and Byron Vaughns, DBs Julius Wood, Josh DeBerry and Emany Johnson. TE Spann-Ford is a physical player to provide a key piece for this offense. He shows sure hands to catch and consistent blocking. He has the talent to press for a roster spot and could shock and win a role in the multiple sets. He was an excellent inline addition and capable of reps.

**Training Camp Objectives:** Cowboys won the NFC East title, but were hammered in the opening round of the playoffs by the Packers. QB Dak Prescott lights up mediocre and sub .500 teams, but struggles vs top clubs that plays out in the postseason. His supporting cast changes with at least two new starting linemen and receivers along with new running backs. RB Zeke Elliott returns, though maybe limited to a 1A role. Young receiver CeeDee Lamb is a premier playmaker, but could present contract issues over the next season. Vet Brandin Cooks is still a quality



performer in three wideout sets. The line presents major challenges, though they probably have two new starters from their draft class. forming a potent trio. TE Jake Ferguson and Luke Schoonmaker to form a reliable pair. The offensive line will miss veteran LT Tyron Smith. The defense is revolves around All-Pro LB Micah Parsons who is an impact performer. He possibly becomes a contract holdout. Young defenders, DT Smith and LB Overshown need to step up and fill roles in this changing unit with marginal depth. The LBing unit needs to step up after starters' Leighton Vander Esch's retirement. The front four will miss DE Dorance Armstrong's 7.5 sacks. He figures to earn time in sub packages in camp with interesting upside.

With their two #4 picks, they chose OT Gio Manu and safety Sione Vaki. Manu is an international player who had a knock out workout at an amazing 6'7" 350 lbs. He has the physical package and skill set to eventually start in the league. He was the earliest international player ever selected in the NFL Draft. Vaki is a tough savvy versatile athlete who lined up at both safety and running back. He gets his first look at safety where he shows strong tackling and good range. Needs coverage development. Top special teams' defender and good role defender. With their two 6th round picks, they chose DT Mehki Wingo and guard Christian Mahogany. Wingo is a quick penetrator with the talent to play in line rotation as a rusher. He was productive vs SEC talent and could be an early contributor in the sub package. Good addition. Mahogany is a tough physical blocker who was a surprise this late. He is a sound technician with good mobility and toughness to make this roster. He has top core strength that translates well to the field. The Lions project him to eventually start inside and be a valuable backup his first few seasons. **Grade: B**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Lions were aggressive in the FA market. They addressed their defensive front with a few high-priced veterans in DE Marcus Davenport and DT DJ Reader. DT Reader is a top run stuffer who gives them a solid interior anchor. DE Davenport hopes to emerge opposite edge defender Aidan Hutchinson. They added FAs, corner Arik Robertson, WR Tre'Quan Smith and guard Kevin Zeiter. They traded their #3 selection for corner Carlton Davis, an excellent addition for their pressing secondary needs. They lost C.J. Gardner-Johnson, WR Josh Reynolds, guard Jonah Jackson, QB Teddy Bridgewater and DT Benito Jones. CB Cameron Sutton was released due to a domestic violent situation, though was resigned by June. They signed a good group of rookie UDFAs with the talent to surprise. They added WR Jalon Calhoun and WR Isaiah Williams, TE Isaac Rex, C Duke Clemens, Kingsley Eguakun and Bryan Hudson, OLB Isaac Ukwu, Nate Lynn, DaRon Gilbert and Steele Chambers, CB Morice Norris and S Chelen Garnes and Loren Strickland, LS Hogan Hatten and PK James Turner. Wideouts Calhoun and Williams will get a long look here. TE Rex is a quality receiver with the talent to surprise and is especially effective in the red zone. LB Chambers has the talent to be a nickel backer and quality special teams' performer.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Lions won the NFC North and their first playoff game since 1991. They won two postseason games before losing a heartbreaker to the 49ers. HC Campbell has led this club to the playoffs in three short years. He has assembled tough hard-nosed players who buy into the program. Young QB Jared Goff emerged as a top flight passer with an impressive performance of over 4500 yards and a 30/12 TD/int ratio. He looks to former top pick Jamison Williams to step in year three and provide big play ability. He has the deep speed to couple with star Amon-Ra St. Runners, David Montgomery and rookie Jahmyr Gibbs provide impact here to rank among the league leaders. The line ranks among the best in the game. TE LaPorta was awesome as a rookie and gave this attack an added dimension. Their young defense improved, though struggled, especially their porous secondary. They will have two new starters there. Edge defender Aidan Hutchinson is a difference maker. New defensive veterans, CB Davis and DT will provide leadership along with young backer Jack Campbell. The Lions climbed the mountain to win the division. With their two #2 picks, they chose LB Edgerrin Cooper and safety Javon Bullard. Cooper is a blue-chip athlete with versatility and big play talent. He came on strong, showing well rounded and developed instincts and skills to be a three-down starter in either scheme. He has an incredible ceiling to provide impact as a pass rusher and sideline to sideline finisher. Bullard is an aggressive hard-hitting defender who excels near the LOS. He shows top range and good open field tackling. Needs development in man coverage with better grades in zones. Probably couples with Xavier McKinney to form a new safety tandem after only 7 interceptions in 2023 for the complete secondary. He was the first of three safeties selected in the NFL Draft.

With their two #3 picks, they chose runner Marshawn Lloyd and LB Ty'Ron Hopper. Lloyd is a quick instinctive runner who came on fast in the postseason. He has natural receiving skills with elusiveness in the openfield and the burst to break plays. He can earn the 1A role behind new veteran Josh Jacobs. Hopper is a quick hitter who finishes well. Needs some development on his initial reads and drops in coverage, though should excel of special team units early.

In the 4th round, they chose safety Evan Williams, a savvy defender with good tackling skills. He figures to press for time in the sub package where he is consistently in good position to make plays. Sure tackler with the talent to become a fixture on special teams. With two 5th round picks, they choose center Jacob Monk and safety Kitan Oladapo. Monk is a smart pivotman who gives them a solid backup with extensive experience. Oladapo finished strong with an impressive Senior Bowl. He is a physical defender who finishes like a linebacker and the agility to matchup in coverage. Excellent value here and possible starter in time, with early impact on special teams.

In the 6th round, they chose OT Travis Glover, a massive blocker who impressed in individual drills. He has the physical package for right tackle or guard and can make this roster. He displays developed skill set to surprise and push for time early in his career. With two 7th round picks, they choose QB Michael Pratt and DB Kalen King. McKinney had a big contract finale and received a huge contract. Dillard has been a 1st round bust. They lost RB Aaron Jones, OT David Bakhtiari, LB DeVondre Campell, OG Jon Runyan, safeties Darnell Savage and Rudy Ford and TE Josiah Deguara. Bakhtiari has been an annual injury problem. With two 6th round picks, they chose OT Walter Rouse and PK Will Reichard. OT Rouse played the left side both at Oklahoma and Stanford. He has fine length and agility to protect the edge. He is only adequate in run blocking and needs to bend to utilize his size. Good late selection. PK Reichard set NCAA records for scoring. He excelled under pressure and can win the starting job here and flourish in a dome situation.

With two 7th round picks, they chose center Michael Jurgens and DT Levi Drake-Rodriguez. OL Jurgens performed well in the ACC and has the skill set to surprise and make this roster. He gives them a solid backup at all the interior positions. DT Drake-Rodriguez is tough interior defender with good technique and natural strength. He is still raw in certain areas and needs time, though is capable of surprising here with marginal depth inside. **Grade: C+**  
**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Vikings signed FAs, runner Aaron Jones, QB Sam Darnold, edge Jonathan Greenard, LB Andrew Van Ginkel, Kamu Grugler-Hill and Blake Cashman, DT Jerry Tillery and corners Shaquill Griffin and Joejuan Williams. Darnold has the inside track on the starting job. Edge defender Greenard is an emerging impact rusher and excellent addition. LB Van Ginkel developed into a playmaker and reunites with DC Brian Flores. They lost QB Kirk Cousins, DEs Danielle Hunter, Marcus Davenport and Jonah Williams, LBers Jordan Hicks and DJ Wonnum, RB Alexander Attison, WR K J Osborn and guard Dalton Risner. They added an average rookie UDFAs class in WR Devron Harper, WR Ty James and WR Jashaun Jones, TE Trey Knox, OL Matt Cindric, OL Jeremy Flax, OL Doug Nester and OL Spencer Rolland, Edge Gabriel Murphy, DL Tyler Manoa, DL Taki Taimani, OLB Owen Porter, OLB Bo Richter, LB K.J. Cloyd, LB Dallas Gant and LB Donovan Manuel and CB Dwight McGlothern. Edge Murphy will press for a roster spot and can make this club and eventually earn time as a situational pass rusher.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Vikings missed the playoffs going 1-6 to close the season. They turned the page on the QB Kirk Cousins era after a midseason ending Achilles injury. Wideout Justin Jefferson remain one of the best receivers in the game. Rookie top pick wideout Jordan Addison had an excellent first season and fine compliment to Jefferson. TE TJ Hockenson played a big role here to justify his 2022 trade. The line was among the best in pass protection behind O'Neill and Darrisaw. The defense was mediocre at best with continuous pass defensive issues. They allow too much air yardage with few big plays. The secondary must step up and third year top picks, safety Cine and corner Booth face a critical preseason. Their defense must improve if they expect to compete for the playoffs. The offense needs new leadership with vet Darold hoping to hold off rookie top pick JJ McCarthy. With concerns about offensive leadership and the turnover on defense, this club will probably struggle to stay pace in the tough competitive NFC North. His combination of size, bulk, length, agility and technique makes him a plug and play rookie starter here. He performed very well vs top competition and was an excellent addition here

WR Means is a speedster with raw skills to mold into a weapon. He has top straight-line speed, but must develop better intermediate route running and quicker coverage. LB Ford is a mobile defender with sure strong tackling. He needs work on separating from blockers and developing further in coverage. Top special teams' performer. With their 6th round pick, they selected DT Khristian Boyd, a quick interior lineman with nice production over his small college career. He is quick off the ball with the length and footwork to penetrate and use his natural power to wreck-havoc on the inside. He was excellent value here and can make this roster and see time in the line rotation. With their 7th round pick, they selected OT Josiah Ezirim, a huge developmental prospect with limited time on offense. He has great size and agility and the tools to mold, though very raw currently. Ideal PS candidate. Fine late selection.

He has amazing run after the catch ability and has the skill set to give this struggling offense impact juice. Best Giant receiver since Odell Beckham who we compared him to in our YB in March 2024.

With their 2nd round pick, they chose safety Tyler Nubin on a selection they received for Leonard Williams to the Seahawks. Their original #2 pick was traded for edge rusher Brian Burns. Nubin is versatile playmaker with

excellent production and prototypical skills. He can win a starting job vacated by overrated Xavier McKinney. His ball skills are a welcome addition and he has early three down starting talent. Solid addition here.

With their 3rd round pick, they came right back and addressed the secondary with the selection of corner Andru Phillips. He was a fast-rising cover man who graded out high in the SEC. He has fluid hips with quick footwork and the recovery speed to mirror receivers. He is a reliable tackler and can win the slot role with a good preseason. He has starting talent and is NFL ready for the sub packages. Fits a need and quality addition. With their 4th round pick, they chose TE Theo Johnson, a big athlete with interesting physical skills. He has well rounded talent, though needs development in technique and route running. He addresses a major need after the retirement of Darren Waller in June. He will couple with vet Daniel Bellinger to form a good duo with developing talent. Johnson was a big upside with development.

With their 5th round pick, they chose runner Tracy Tyrone, a versatile athlete with prior experience at receiver. He is an ideal 1A type and rated as one of the top sleepers in our Yearbook. Natural receiver with big play ability and runner with his best football ahead of him. Excellent sleeper with good cutting skills and vision to make tough inside yardage and the quickness to make the edge. Talent to become a huge surprise and one of our most underrated prospects in this class. With their 6th round selection, they drafted LB Darius Muasau, an active defender who plays with his hair on fire. He shows great range and the ability to finish with strong tackling. He can play overaggressive at times and needs to play under control especially in space. Capable of being the nickel backer to shadow scramblers in addition to being a fixture on special teams' coverage units. Quality role defender and a fine late addition. **Grade: B+**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** They added a few quality starters in FA in hopes of improving their young struggling offense. They signed starters, RB Devin Singletary, OL Jon Runyan and Jermaine Eluemunor, along with key backups. Singletary replaces Saquan Barkley who left in FA. He rushed for almost as much yardage last season as Barkley. He is an underrated back whose well-rounded talent will help this offense. Runyan and Eluemunor are quality veterans who will start at guard where the GMen had continuous problems in 2023. They came provide stability on the inside bookending talented center John Michael Schmitz. They traded for edge defender Brian Burns, using their #2 pick for a double-digit pass rusher. He couples with Kayvon Thibodeaux to form a potent edge pair, both capable of big sack numbers. They lost starters, RB Barkley, safety Xavier McKinney, guard Ben Bredeson and DT A'Shawn Robinson. They signed a good rookie FA class with a few having solid chances to make the roster or PS. They signed WR Ayir Asante, WR John Jiles, OT Marcellus Johnson, G Jake Kubas, DE Ovie Oghoufo, DL Casey Rogers and DB Alex Johnson. OT Johnson is a big mobile athlete with intriguing upside. He can win a roster spot here.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Giants struggled early and could never overcome their terrible 2-8 start. HC Brian Daboll had to rotate three starting QBs, when Daniel Jones went down with an ACL injury in mid-October. The weak injury riddled offensive line struggled especially in protection, allowing a league high 84 sacks. LT Andrew Thomas missed seven games and this club needs a full season from him if they hope for Daniel Jones to return to former levels. Young center Michael Schmitz is primed for a breakout performance and key interior blocker. Young RT Evan Neal struggled again and missed over half the season. He must prove capable of starting on the right side. Top pick wideout Malik Nabers has the playmaking talent to raise this offense to a new level. He is that good. His versatility allows him to play inside and outside and also projects to free safety. Very good choice if he proves durable.

With their 3rd round pick, they chose edge defender Jalyx Hunt, a long athlete who continues to improve. Showed well at the Senior Bowl and NFL Combine. He has the burst off the edge to develop into an outside pass rusher. Very raw after time at two lower-level schools. Though a project, he has the skill set to push for reps in the sub package as an edge rusher. Though a slight reach, he has the impact talent to develop in time.

With three 5th round picks, they chose WR/RS Ainias Smith, LB Jeremiah Trotter and OG Trevor Keegan. Smith struggled returning from a 2022 ACL injury. He is an outstanding return specialist with the skills to press for time as a slot receiver. He can provide playmaking ability if he can stay healthy. LB Trotter fell off average type measurables. He hopes to follow his father as an Eagle starter on the inside. He was good value here and can be an immediate impact defender on special teams' units. An eventual starter and solid addition here. OG Keegan is a big physical blocker with good grades over his late career. He gives them good depth while he develops.

With two 6th round picks, they chose WR Johnny Wilson and center Dylan McMahon. Wilson is a wideout/TE hybrid with terrific length and good body control and hands. He gives them a versatile piece for multiple sets, though currently a weak blocker. McMahon could win a backup role or a PS position and ultimately a place in their interior rotation.

High level of development should allow him to play immediately in sub packages with early starting grade.

With their 3rd round selection, they choose OL Dominick Puni, an experienced lineman with time at tackle and guard. Graded out high in the Big 12 and had a good postseason. He uses his bulk and hands well to win early on the down and gain consistent positioning. He needs some development, though has the physical skills to start with development, most likely at guard.

With three 4th round selections, they choose safety Malik Mustapha, RB Isaac Guerendo and WR Jacob Cowing. Mustapha is an athlete with good range and coverage skills. He improved fast over his late career and gets a chance here to press for time in the dime package. Lacks length in matchups with big receivers, especially tight ends. He can win a role in the dime package early in his career. RB Guerendo is a top athlete with elite numbers. Good straight-line runner with a physicality to get reps in short yardage and eventually a 1A back. Good addition here. WR Cowing is a quick elusive playmaker with the long speed to break plays. Quality return specialist probably earns him a roster spot. Eventual slot receiver with the suddenness to create space and make plays. Top role addition.

With their 6th round selections, they choose OG Jarrett Kinston, a smart versatile interior blocker. He will press for a roster spot in camp and has the talent to develop further. He could land on the PS for a few seasons. With their 7th round selection, they choose LB Tatum Bethune, a hard-hitting defender with experience vs top competition. He is a physical tackler who fills inside and can press for a roster spot here. He must prove valuable of special teams' coverage units to earn time to develop in the base defense. He may sit on the PS for a season, but gives the 49ers insurance on a thin unit.

Good hands and the length to be a fine target in the middle zones. Second TE drafted in addition to FA Mike Gesicki. Needs to improve as a blocker, though a prospect with definite make it grade. Edge Johnson has a burst from the outside and was a productive SEC defender. One-dimensional defender with periods of baffling inconsistencies. Late gamble to be an edge rushing role defender. With two 7th-round picks, they selected Daijahn Anthony and center Matt Lee. Anthony was a versatile defender with good, though inconsistent play. He could earn time on the PS if he has a good preseason. Lee is a smallish pivotman with consistent grades. Four-year starter with makeup to make this roster. **Grade: B**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Bengals made a few key changes in FA. They added TE Mike Gesicki, OT Trent Brown, RB Zack Moss, DT Sheldon Rankins and safeties Vonn Bell and Geno Stone. TE Gesicki could be one of the best FA signings in the league. He could finally realize his talent working with Burrow. Stone is an emerging playmaker and was signed away from rival, the Ravens. They lost WR Tyler Boyd, DT DJ Reader, RB Joe Mixon, TE Irv Smith, RT Jonah Willaims, OG Max Scharping and CB Chidobe Awuzie. They added rookie free agents, QB Rocky Lombardi, RB Noah Cain, RB Elijah Collins, WR Cole Burgess, WR Tre Mosley, TE Cam Grandy, OT Eric Miller, DE Justin Blazek, LB Maema Njongmeta, LB Aaron Casey, CB Lance Robinson, S Michael Dowell, S PJ Jules and P Austin McNamara. LB Casey can surprise here and make this roster.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Bengals missed the postseason after QB Joe Burrow went down with a season ending wrist injury. They made many changes this offseason along the line and at several skill positions. Burrow had a hot hand when he went down for the season. With an expected improved offensive line this season, his success should continue. Pro Bowl receiver Ja'Marr Chase and talented Tee Higgins gives them the best tandem in the league. Bengals replaced runner Joe Mixon and looks to new vet Moss and Chase Brown to step up. The defense was below average in many areas, though big plays minimized the damage. The defense relied on edge defenders Trey Hendrickson and Sam Hubbard to apply consistent pressure. They still allow too many big plays and will have open competition in the secondary with safeties Dax Hill, Jordan Battle and FA addition Stone vying for starting roles. Mike man Logan Wilson is a warrior and anchor here. Bengals continue to address problems areas quickly – offensive line and secondary to stay competitive. He was a surprise this early, though an impressive Senior Bowl helped his cause immensely. He figures to see time in their tackle rotation.

With their 3rd round pick, they choose OG Zak Zinter, a massive blocker who sustained a late career broken leg injury which forced him down the rankings. Physical and tenacious, with the technique to sustain and win consistently. Carries an early starting grade off strong fundamentals and experience when healthy which could early in 2024.

With their 5th round pick, they choose wideout Jamari Thrash, a fast athlete with the ability to win in the vertical game. His inconsistent hands are an area of concern and must improve to warrant time in multiple sets. Boom or bust prospect with impact ability if he improves his liabilities. With their 6th round pick, they choose LB Nathaniel Watson, an aggressive Mike man with good instincts and sure tackling. He can win a roster spot here and eventually start. He should be a core special teams' performer.

With their two 7th round picks, they choose CB Myles Harden and DT Jowon Briggs. Harden is an underrated cover man who got lost in a deep corner group. He has the talent to fit into the dime package with experience. He should make this roster if he shows well on special teams. Briggs is a tough interior penetrator who will compete for a roster spot, though may need time on the PS to refine his skills. **Grade: C**

Hunt, OT Geron Christian, TE Harrison Bryant, OC Nick Harris, DT Jordan Elliott and LBers Anthony Walker and Sione Takitaki. They traded for WR Jerry Jeudy for two late selections. They added a few rookies from the open market in RB Aidan Robbins, WR Ahmarean Brown, TE Treyton Welch, OT Lorenzo Thompson, G Javion Cohen, LB Winston Reid, CB Dyshawn Gales and S Christopher Edmonds.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Browns made the playoffs behind veteran passer Joe Flacco who won four games in December carrying them to a 11-6 record. Veteran QB Deshaun Watson returns after a shoulder injury limited him to 6 games. HC Kevin Stefanski did a masterful job to guide this club to the postseason, while starting 5 QBs in the process. Veteran runner Nick Chubb returns from a knee injury which limited him to 2 games. RB Jerome Ford did a solid job, though a better 1A type. The line looks to the return of LT Wills and RT Conklin. The receiving corps added Jeudy to join young receivers Elijah Moore and Cedric Tillman plus #1 vet Amani Cooper. TE Njoku has been very productive. Their defense ranked #1 in the league. Sack artist DE Myles Garrett had a dominant performance with 14 sacks. Their LBing unit added vets Hicks and Bush. The secondary has one of the better units with depth to perform well in all the sub packages. Talented corners, Denzel Ward and Martin Emerson form a top flight cover tandem. The Browns have some of the building blocks in place to compete in the AFC North, though Watson and the line may dictate how far they go this season. With their 3rd round pick, they chose LB Jonah Elliss, a quick rusher with big play talent. He comes off a strong 2023 performance and plays both inside and outside with the ability to blitz. His sideline-to-sideline speed will enable him to be a third down defender and probably plays in sub package as a rookie.

With their 4th round pick, they chose wideout Troy Franklin, a fast lean receiver with big play ability. He fell in a deep class and was excellent value here. He can play in three wideout sets and has shown the ability to get deep on a defense. With two 5th round picks, they chose CB Kris Abrams-Draine and runner Audric Estime. Abrams-Draine is a smaller tough cover man with quick ball skills and good instincts. He can win the nickel role here with a good camp. He can win the return role immediately and is a natural returner in that role. With their 6th round selection, they selected PK Cam Little, a strong legged experience kicker. deep and open this attack. His presence changes their passing game and allows Mahomes to use the deep game. Worthy is also a dangerous returner.

With their 2nd round pick, they choose OT Kingsley Suamataia, a big mobile blocker who came on well over his late career. Possibly moves inside to guard and needs technique development. Will compete for early starting time with FA changes. Good mental makeup, combined with solid athleticism. Fine addition and long-term starter. With two 4th round picks, they choose TE Jared Wiley and safety Jaden Hicks. TE Wiley is an emerging prospect and excellent value here. He presents a big target with sure hands and easy movement through the middle zones. He can be a valuable backup for multiple sets and creates space to get open and give his passer a reliable target. Safety Hicks shows top athleticism with good instincts. Shows the range and flexible hips to open up

and mirror receivers in man situations. Capable of being a key defender in the sub packages with experience lining up at a few positions.

With their 5th round pick, they choose center Hunter Nourzad, a versatile tough lineman with good grades in the Big Ten. Looks to win a roster spot on versatility with his talent best suited for the interior. Solid backup. With their 6th round pick, they choose CB Kamal Hadden, a long instinctive athlete who fell off injury concerns. Prior shoulder injuries limited his playing time. Gets opportunity here with key FA loss of Sneed. Aggressive and sure tackler with the quality skill set to fit this defense. Excellent late gamble.

With their 7th round pick, they choose OG C.J. Hanson, a good technician with mobility to carry out assignments. Needs strength work to anchor vs big NFL tackles. Smart blocker with good hands to gain control and the raw talent to improve here, though may need to develop on the PS his first few seasons. **Grade: B**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Chiefs signed WRs Marquise Brown and Mecole Hardman, QB Carson Wentz, TE Irv Smith, DT Mike Pennel, CB Kelvin Joseph and punter Matt Araiza. They lost corner L’Jarius Sneed, LB Willie Gay, S Mike Edward, WRs Marquez Valdes-Scantling and Ricky James, OT Donovan Smith, G Nick Allegretti and RB Jerrick McKinnon. Came on strong over his late career and projects to guard here and probably wins a rookie starting job. Solid addition here. He was a surprise this early, though has intriguing skills to advance quickly through further development.

With their 4th round pick, they selected the first of three defensive backs in CB DeCameron Richardson. He is an excellent athlete with the raw skills to start in time. He will be pushed in camp to see if he can absorb their system. He gets fooled too often, though has the speed to make up for his mistakes. Needs work on his initial reads and the ability to transition in coverage. With their 5th round pick, they picked LB Tommy Eichenberg, a productive Mike man with top instincts and good fundamentals. He was very effective in big game situations and carries a starting grade in time. Top special teams’ performer while he settles into this system.

With their 6th round pick, they selected RB Dylan Laube, a short tough runner with natural skills. He can earn reps here and a change of pace back to expected starter Zamir White. Good value here and possible returner

Fashanu has excellent length with a strong base and the agility to slide in protection. He needs refinement on his technique

and hand usage along with bending his knees more consistently. He was a solid addition and possibly could slide inside to guard early for experience. He needs to get stronger to get a better push in run support. They traded their #2 pick prior as final payment in the Aaron Rodgers deal.

With their 3rd round pick, they choose wideout Malachi Corley, a tough talented pass catcher with excellent run after the catch ability. He fits both inside and outside and is a developed route runner coming out of a pro style passing game at WK. He has a strong frame and quick feet which allows him to be a running back in the open field. We compared him to Deebo Samuel in our March Yearbook and he can provide impact here working with Rodgers. He can get single coverage often and capable of being very productive operating vs a nickel corner. Excellent selection and early impact potential.

With their 4th round pick, they selected runner Braelon Allen, a big tough back with high production. He has a strong frame with a quick burst to the hole to move the pile. He is a one cut runner with fine body lean and good ball security. He can be a top backup to starter Bryce Hall. Allen also surprised in mini-camp, showing fine receiving skills and more developed in that role than during his college career. He was a great addition and backup.

With three 5th round picks, they selected QB Jordan Travis, RB Isaiah Davis and CG Qwan'tez Stiggers. QB Travis gives them a developmental passer in the system. He will benefit from both Rodgers and Tyrod Taylor with over 30 years combined experience. He comes off an ankle injury which ended an undefeated season. He is a savvy athlete with mobility, quick delivery and decision making. He probably earns the #3 role and could move up with experience. RB Davis was a surprise after selecting Allen earlier. He is a physical one cut runner with most of his work between the tackles. Kind of baffling selection which duplicates Allen's skill set. CB Stiggers is a CFL defender who did not play in college. He has good size and instincts and plays a physical game. He has the makeup of a gunner on special teams which earns him a roster spot.

With their 7th round pick, they choose 'Mr. Irrelevant', safety Jaylen Key. Transfer from UAB. One year starter. Physical and aggressive with the length to matchup with tight ends. Earns roster spot on his special team's ability in the preseason. **Grade: B**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Jets were very aggressive in FA. They signed FAs, tackles Tyron Smith and Morgan Moses, G John Simpson, WR Mike Williams, QB Tyrod Taylor, DT Leki Fotu and Javon Kinlaw and CB Isaiah Oliver. They traded QB Zach Wilson for a late selection. They lost edge defender Bryce Huff, OL Mekhi Becton, Duane Brown, Conner McGovern and Laken Tomlinson, DL John Franklin-Myers, Quinton Jefferson and Carl Lawson, WR Randall Cobb, TE CJ Uzomah, corners Bryce Hall and Javelin Guidry and safety Jordan Whitehead. They traded for LB Haason Reddick, an excellent edge rusher for a conditional early selection. They signed an average UDFAs class in QB Andrew Peasley, QB Colby Suits, WR Tyler Harrell, WR Marcus Riley, TE Lincoln Sefcik, OL Brady Latham, OL Willie Tyler, DE Eric Watts, DT Leonard Taylor III, edge Tyreek Johnson, edge Braiden McGregor, LB Jimmy Ciarlo, LB Jackson Sirmon, CB Jarius Monroe, CB Shemar Bartholomew, CB Myles Jones, S Al Blades Jr. and DB Brandon Codrington.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Jets missed the playoffs for the 13th consecutive season, losing five consecutive games at midseason. GM Douglas's five-year record to 27-56. He put his stack on veteran QB Aaron Rodgers who was injured after four plays in 2023. Young QB Zach Wilson was a colossal mistake as the 2<sup>nd</sup> overall selection in 2021 and was traded during the offseason. The Jets have a stronger supporting cast for Rodgers with new additions at the skilled positions. The line will have three new starters plus the return of OL Alijah Vera-Tucker. They will have to improve off last season's terrible performance. LT Mekhi Becton was not resigned after four horrible seasons. Wideout Garrett Wilson is a blue-chip receiver with big play ability which Rodgers will feed if healthy. New receiver, Malachi Corley gives this unit a boost from the slot. Vet Mike Williams is a big-time receiver, though may not be ready until Sept/Oct. Rodgers can elevate every player's game a level if healthy. HC Robert Saleh turned the offense over to OC Nathaniel Hackett. His first season was marred by multiple injuries. Saleh had Jets highly regarded defense playing well over the full season. They dominated at times, featuring DT Quinnen Williams, Mike backer CJ Mosley and corner Sauce Gardner among the best at their positions. New edge rusher Riddick and young edge defender Jermaine Johnson is present a big play tandem. The defense needs to stay healthy, especially Mosley while the young secondary looks to safety Chuck Clark to step in and start. The improved offensive line may be the most important addition for Rodgers. HC Saleh has a thrrr-year record of 18-33 which makes all the SB hype a stretch, though the Jets are capable of a huge turn around and finally make the playoffs. A soft early schedule may jump start this club to the top of the AFC. Rodgers has the talent to carry a club and the Jets have the improved supporting cast to press for the playoffs.

The Steelers addressed their top needs with their early selections. In the 1st round, they wanted another top tackle and selected Troy Fautanu. He is an agile tackle with refined technique and quick footwork and hands to play LT in the NFL. He is fast developing prospect with agility, enough length and big game experience to push for starting time as a rookie. He needs to impress in the preseason and prove he can handle NFL edge speed consistently

to line up at left tackle. He may also start inside at guard and ladder out with experience. Makeup of a quality NFL starter on this revamped line where he can be an anchor and probably earn a starting job in camp.

With their 2nd round pick, they came right back and selected OL Zach Frazier. They have had an incredible legacy in the pivot and Frazier could be the next inline. He has excellent core strength and top technique especially his hands after a wrestling career. His level of development will allow him to compete for the starting job, where he has the skills to win in the preseason.

With two 3rd round picks, they choose wideout Roman Wilson and LB Payton Wilson. WR Wilson had a strong final season and can line up both in the slot or outside. He has good run after the catch ability and is a disciplined playmaker. He should earn early time in their three wideout sets and fine target for their new passers. LB Wilson is a terrific Mike man with the speed, instincts and toughness. He can win a starting three down interior job here, though he must prove durable to realize his blue-chip talent. Excellent gamble here

With their 4th round pick, they choose guard Mason McCormick, a sound technician from the small college level. He is well developed and will push for time with a strong preseason. He projects as a starter on the inside, though probably sits a season to settle into the system and culture. Solid addition to pay big dividends in time.

With two 6th round picks, they choose DL Logan Lee and CB Ryan Watts. DL Lee is a good technician after time at Iowa and fits a five-technique role. He can surprise here and make this squad with a good preseason. He could fit in a line rotation. Watts is a good addition here and will press for immediate time in their sub package with a chance of winning a role there. He is a long cover man with prior experience at safety. We rated him much higher off an impressive close to his career. He will press for time in their packages and could surprise. His length and safety experience makes him an interesting matchup with speed and instincts. Top late addition. **Grade: A**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Steelers signed or acquired two QBs in Russell Wilson and Justin Fields. They will fight it out in the preseason for the starting job. They traded young former 1st round starter Kenny Pickett who was given only two seasons in the Steel city, hardly a fair chance to show his talent. They signed LB Patrick Queen, WRs Von Jefferson, Quez Watkins and Cordarrelle Patterson, TE Mycole Pruitt and safety DeShon Eloit. They traded for CB Donte Jackson for wideout Diontae Johnson. They lost free agents, CBs Patrick Peterson and Levi Wallace, WR Allen Robinson, OL Mason Cole and Chukwuma Okorafor, QBs Mason Rudolph and Mitch Trubisky and safety Keanu Neal. They added rookie free agents QB John Rhys Plumlee, RB Daijun Edwards, LB



Julius Welschof, LB Jacoby Windmon and CB/RS Beanie Bishop. With the trade of Diontae Johnson, Bishop could surprise and win PR job and develop as a nickel corner.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Steelers made the playoffs winning their final three games in the process. They lost to the Bills in the opening round. They turn the page with new starters on offense at QB, WR and offensive line. The QB camp battle of Wilson and Fields will determine their direction. The young talented offensive line added blue chip blockers and could provide better protection and better run blocking. Wideout George Pickens had a solid performance, though will be without vet Diontae Johnson. Rookie WR Wilson and vet Jefferson are counted on to become productive playmakers. They relied on steady vet RB Najee Harris to give them power running and he added 1000+ rushing. TE Pat Freiermuth missed time which effected his production. He is primed to return to 2022 levels. They look to OT Broderick Jones to help their line improve. The changing line expects at least two rookies to win starting jobs. Their defense got a strong performance from All-Pro backer TJ Watt who produced 19 sacks. Edge defender Alex Highsmith had a solid effort with 7 sacks. They look to FA backer Patrick Queen to be a tackling machine here. S Minkah Fitzpatrick missed 7 games, though was still a sound defender. They want to run the ball more effectively, in addition to increasing their 3<sup>rd</sup> down efficiency and point totals where they rank among the worst in the league. The offensive line may hold the key to any improved production. The Steelers should be competitive in the tough North division, though their veteran defense must return to prior levels to assist their changing offense. They have won divisional matchups with a 5-1 record last season, though probably tough to duplicate that in 2024. To return to the playoffs, they need a stronger ground game to balance an unknown passing game with a new starter.

The Titans held their position in the first round and selected OT JC Latham, a highly developed versatile lineman. He is SEC battle tested and NFL ready. He gets a chance to win the starting LT job, though was not ready at mini-camp for that test. Seems ready for right tackle where most of his snaps were at Bama. Good fit and second consecutive #1 pick for offensive line.

With their 2nd round pick, they selected DT T'Vondre Sweat, a massive interior lineman with

dominant skills. He can anchor vs the double team and is a force in run defense which sets the pace for this unit. He has the athleticism to push the pocket and rush the passer, though technique work will help him improve. Playing next to Jeffery Simmons can allow him to shine in single assignments. Solid addition to fill out this front line.

With their 4th round pick, they selected LB Cedric Gray, a rangy defender who moves well with the instincts to gain a fast advantage on plays. Excelled in the Senior Bowl and can compete for a rookie starting job with well-rounded skills. Excellent value here.

With their 5th round pick, they selected CB Jarvis Brownlee, a physical cover man who is aggressive in coverage and competes for the ball. He will earn time in sub packages here with a good combination of size, instincts, quickness and toughness. Good addition and early contributor. With their 6th round pick, they selected WR Jha'Quan Jackson, a short compact fast receiver. He was very productive at Tulane and fits the slot role where he can win the starting job in camp. Nice late addition.

With two 7th round picks, they selected LB/S James Williams and edge Jaylen Harrell. Hybrid Williams needs to define his pro position. He lined up mainly at safety, though his coverage skills are not fully developed there. At Will or nickel backer, he can be in the box where his speed allows him to pursue and matchup in the short zones. Edge defender Harrell has a quick burst to penetrate, though needs further hand usage to counter once his initial move is contained. He carries a make it grade here, though maybe on the PS in 2024. **Grade: C**

**Rookie & Veteran Free Agency:** The Titans added veterans, WR Calvin Ridley, RB Tony Pollard, TE Trevon Wesco, OL Saahdig Charles and Lloyd Cushenberry, DL Sebastian Joshep-Day, LB Kenneth Murray and corners L'Jarius Sneed and Chidobe Awuzie. They lost RB Derrick Henry, QB Ryan Tannehill, OL Andrew Brewer, Andre Dillard and Cory Levin, DL Denico Autry and Marlon Davidson, LB Azeez Al-Shaair, CBs Kristian Fulton and Sean Murphy-Bunting and safeties Terrell Edmunds and K'Von Wallace. Titans signed an average group of rookie UDFAs in RB Dillon Johnson, RB Jabari Small, WR Bryce Oliver, WR Sam Schnee, TE Steven Stilianos, TE David Martin-Robinson, OL X'Zauvea Gadlin, OL Brian Dooley, OL Cole Spencer, DL Isaiah Iton, DE Khalid Duke, CB Gabe Jeudy-Lally, CB Robert Javier, CB Rod Gattison, S Keaton Ellis and PK Brayden Narveson.

**Training Camp Objectives:** The Titans decline continued and they missed the postseason for the 2nd year in a row. HC Mike Vrabel was fired after an excellent long tenure, directing them to the postseason annually. They made wholesale changes in the offseason, parting ways with runner Derrick Henry and QB Ryan Tannehill, two core

performers during their playoff seasons. The offense fell significantly and changed to rookie QB Will Levis, a strong-armed passer with interesting potential. He started over half the season and will be the leader here. He will work with new weapons, WR Ridley and RB Pollard behind a young and talented line. Former top pick WR Treyton Burks faces a critical preseason after a very disappointing 2023 season. Their defense is built around DT Jeffery Simmons, though offenses have doubled him often. Edge defender Harold Landry had double digit sacks after returning from an ACL injury. They need their front seven to be more productive to help Simmons. The secondary made major changes after another poor performance with few big plays and huge air yardage allowed. They added vet corners, Sneed and Awuzie to stabilize this unit. This club will probably struggle to be competitive in the improving AFC South. Young players will have to produce for them to improve and reverse recent seasons. They face a big rebuilding process which has just started.
